Why is Benin reliant on electricity imports?

Benin is reliant on electricity imports for a significant share of its energy supply. Reform programmes, including plans for electrification, have been put in place in the country, where only 30% of the population had access to electricity in 2017. How many hydropower plants are there in Benin?

The Ouémé River, the largest river in Benin, was estimated to be able to house around ten hydropower plants with power ratings ranging between 10 MW and 160 MW.

This paper summarizes the current RE situation in Benin and examines its future prospects.

Does Benin have a hydroelectric potential?

According to a study by Ref. , Benin has considerable hydroelectric potential for developing large, medium, small, and micro-hydroelectric plants in the Borgu and Oloufès regions, for example, with estimated generation capacities at 70 GWh and 72 GWh, respectively.

Will Benin build a re-gasification plant in 2035?

Via this plan, Benin could create thermoelectric power plants with capacities up to 550 MW by 2035, and install a floating natural gas re-gasification unit at the port of Cotonou, with a projected and estimated thermal capacity at 480 MW in 2030 .

Data on Benin's existing on-grid power generation capacity, presented in Table 1, were extracted from the PLEXOS World dataset [3,4,5] using scripts from OSeMOSYS global model generator [23]. PLEXOS World provides estimated capacities and commissioning dates by power plant, based on the World Resources Institute Global Power Plant database [5].
