

Storage modulus is a measure of a material's ability to store elastic energy when it is deformed under stress, reflecting its stiffness and viscoelastic behavior. This property is critical in understanding how materials respond to applied forces, especially in viscoelastic substances where both elastic and viscous characteristics are present. The elastic modulus of an object is defined as the slope of its stress-strain curve in the elastic deformation region: [1] A stiffer material will have a higher elastic modulus. An elastic modulus has the form: $E = \frac{\text{stress}}{\text{strain}}$ where stress is the force causing the deformation divided by the area to which the force is applied and strain is the ratio of the change in some parameter caused by the ...

Flexural properties fall under the ASTM D790 test standard and help to define the properties of the materials when bent or flexed. The test uses a simply supported beam structure and applies a centered point load and measures the stress at the outer fibers of the test sample (Fig. 2.8). Elastic Modulus ($E = \text{Stress}/\text{Strain}$) is a quantity that measures an object or substance's resistance to being deformed elastically when a stress is applied to it. The storage modulus measures the resistance to deformation in an elastic solid. It's related to the proportionality constant between stress and strain in Hooke's Law, which states that extension increases with force.
